Intention	This document was created for Associations and Referee-In-Chiefs to explain and describe this optional program, how it works, and how you can use it.
Purpose of the Program	First Stripes is a Pre-level Program, designed for Half-Ice games. It was developed using the Long Term Officiating Development Matrix, and is intended to build officiating skills that can translate into the Full-Ice program.
Certification	Half-Ice games only. Officials that are part of the First Stripes program are NOT to be used on Full-Ice games. Suggestion: U10S2 games are probably the best fit, with U10S1 (second half of the season) being the next best fit - please give the U10S1's time to learn how to play from their coaches first.
Age	First Stripes program will require officials to be age 12 or older by September of that season. <b>Note for assignors</b> : Please keep in mind the following: RAB has a minimum age of 14 for the Full-Ice (Level 1) program, and to take a Level 2 clinic Ringette Canada has a minimum age of 16. <i>Be cautious about leaving someone in these stages for 4 years.</i>
Number of Officials (please note that plenty of options are given to fit the needs of your association)	<ul> <li>NEVER ALONE! Acceptable combinations: <ol> <li>1 Pre-Level + Junior Mentor</li> <li>1 Pre-Level + 1 Pre-Level + Evaluator/Senior Mentor</li> <li>1 Pre-Level + 1 Pre-Level / Pre-Level + 1 Pre-Level + Evaluator/Senior Mentor (2 games happening at once)</li> <li>4) Coach <ol> <li>Pre-level Officials are NOT to officiate solo, or 'with' a coach, this program operates with 2 officials or NONE</li> </ol> </li> <li>**Coaches are still asked to be on the ice when there are officials, as coaches are still in charge of rink markings, and coaching their athletes on ice.</li> <li>Definitions of mentors: <ol> <li>Evaluator = Fully certified via evaluation clinics</li> <li>Senior Mentor = Official that has completed their 2/3 or 4 clinic, but has not yet taken the evaluation clinics, MUST also have proven to give mature and constructive feedback</li> <li>Junior Mentor = 1 Level 1 WITH AN Evaluation completed, MUST also have proven to give mature and constructive feedback</li> </ol> </li> </ol></li></ul>

Roles (Different roles and their expectations)	<ul> <li>Officials: <ul> <li>Apply rules and knowledge learned in this training</li> <li>Communicate with coaches before the game</li> <li>Using a gamecard</li> <li>Manage the game</li> <li>Ensure safety is a priority</li> <li>LEARNING is the main role of officials!</li> </ul> </li> <li>Coaches: <ul> <li>Set up nets, barriers, dots, creases, and gamesheet/minor officials AS normal</li> <li>Officials will not being doing this</li> <li>Pre-Level Officiating Program is optional - coaches will do this task <u>ALL the time, with or without officials</u></li> </ul> </li> <li>When Officials are present, coaches should not have to interact with the ring, and are asked to stay out of the paths of the officials and not use their whistles</li> <li>Help their players understand the rules</li> <li>Interact with the officials in a calm tone, these officials are LEARNING</li> </ul> <li>Mentors: <ul> <li>Cheer with positive statements</li> <li>Understand the differences between the half-ice and full-ice program</li> <li>Provide helpful and constructive feedback</li> </ul> </li> <li>Spectators: <ul> <li>Cheer with positive statements</li> <li>Understand that officials are LEARNING and should NEVER question their calls</li> <li>Help foster a positive sports environment for all involved</li> </ul> </li> <li>Associations: <ul> <li>Decide if this program is being used</li> <li>Inform the coaches, spectators on the teams, and leagues <ul> <li>Supplemental education as handouts</li> <li>Monitor this level, check in with officials regularly</li> <li>Manage game assignments, payment, and appropriate pairings</li> </ul> </li> </ul></li>	
Uniform	<ul> <li>All on-ice officials are expected to meet the minimum requirements of the Officials uniform: <ol> <li>A Helmet (preferably black)</li> <li>Can have a half visor, no cage mask</li> </ol> </li> <li>A referee PINNIE <ol> <li>Jersey and crest are not required at this level</li> </ol> </li> <li>A pea whistle (that slides onto your fingers - NOT on a lanyard like a coach)</li> <li>Black, loose-fitting pants</li> <li>Skates</li> </ul>	

	Ringette Alberta will have pinnies. If your association is looking to run this program, the pinnies will be loaned out and expected back at the end of the season.
Payment	It is up to the Associations on what they want to pay officials at this level. Ringette Alberta recommends having similar pay structures to your U10S3 or U12s, as you will have some Full-Ice officials mentoring the half-ice officials.
Process	<ul> <li>This is a pilot program and is optional Meaning that one association might opt in, and another opt out. That is perfectly fine.</li> <li>1) Intake <ul> <li>Once associations have decided if they want to run the program, recruitment starts within the association - just like with the Full-Ice program</li> <li>Let RAB know you are interested in the Program</li> <li>RAB will have a link to a test</li> <li>The association will send this link to their new officials, officials will use the manual to complete the test</li> <li>There will be no fails</li> </ul> </li> <li>2) Registration <ul> <li>All officials will need to register</li> </ul> </li> <li>3) Monitor &amp; Assign &amp; Pay</li> <li>4) Return Pinnies</li> <li>Note to associations: Please do your best, when running this program to be consistent with where you are assigning, with this being an optional program, there will be games without, but within an association, those coaches would appreciate some consistency.</li> </ul>
Gamecard	Officials will be given a GAMECARD, which will include the following information:         -       Pre-game duty roles         -       Make it clear who is to do what between coaches and officials         -       Reminders for the officials         -       Ice Diagram with positioning details         AND most importantly:       -         -       Pre-game Coaches agreement         -       A coach from both teams will need to sign off on a statement before the game, setting expectations         -       Post-game reporting         -       Link or QR code for a quick post-game survey         -       Helps RAB and associations monitor this program
